

## WHAT CONSTITUTES ACCEPTABLE EXPERT TESTIMONY? (DAUBERT CRITERIA)

#### Federal Rule 702:

A witness who is qualified as an expert by knowledge, skill, experience training or education may testify in the form of an opinion if:

- 1. The expert's scientific, technical or other specialized knowledge will help the trier of fact understand the evidence or determine a fact at issue
- 2. The testimony is based on facts or data
- 3. The testimony is product of reliable principles and methods and
- 4. The expert has reliably applied the principles and methods to the facts of the case

#### **HOW I INTERPRET DAUBERT**

#### **Expert opinion:**

- 1. should be based on an expert's training, education, experience,
- 2. be consistent with the standards of care
- 3. be supported by a body of peer reviewed science
- 4. be stated to a degree of medical certainty

#### WHY BECOME A MEDICAL EXPERT?

#### **PROS:**

- It's interesting
- It has made me a better physician
- It pays well
- Satisfaction

#### **CONS:**

- Deadlines can be short
- It can be stressful
- Possible ethical conflicts

#### **DUTIES OF A MEDICAL EXPERT**

- 1. Review records (always)
- 2. Consult with hiring attorney (as needed)
- 3. "Write" an affidavit (sometimes)
- 4. Write a report (usually)
- 5. Sit for a deposition (sometimes)
- 6. Testify in court (sometimes)


#### WHEN YOU TESTIFY:

- 1. Prepare, prepare, prepare....
- 2. Dress for success
- 3. Tell the jury what they need to know, not what you want them to know
- 4. Find ways to connect with jurors
- 5. Pause before answering questions
- 6. Assume counsel knows the answer when he/she asks a question
- 7. Never start an argument with opposing counsel, but stick up for yourself and your opinion(s)
- 8. Avoid words such as liability, negligence, malpractice, maybe, possibly
